Mike Overman Honored For Decades Of Devotion

It's hard to keep Mike Overman on the topic of himself, because he mainly likes to talk about the goodness of other people.

So bring up the Albert Heckler Award, which Mike received at Mercer DD's annual staff recognition banquet on November 17, and Mike will talk about Albert Heckler, for whom the award is named.

THANK YOU, COUNTY VOTERS!



He was good at giving of himself, and so when we (Cheryl Ann Programs at the time, and now the Mercer DD) decided to give an award to honor people for their many contributions, it was natural to name the award after Albert Heckler, and to give him the first one. That was one of the coolest things I ever got to do, was give Albert the first Albert Heckler Award."

Mike was the superintendent of Cheryl Ann Programs at the time, a position he held for 33 years, until his retirement in 2015. The Albert Heckler Award is given annually to an individual who provides exemplary service to people with disabilities in Mercer County. It was never intended to recognize a staff member. But that's okay, because always, Mike Overman was a staff member and a volunteer, and everything in between.

Here's just one example. Years ago, parents confided in Mike that their young adults didn't necessarily enjoy the three-day holiday weekends when Cheryl Ann shut down. They got bored and lonely, missing their friends. Working with ARC, and because Martin Luther King Jr. was a personal hero of his, Mike instituted ARC's annual MLK weekend bingo game, stepped in as the caller and happily handed out prizes. It went



over so well ARC still holds six such bingo events each year.

That was decades ago, and even in his retirement Mike is still at the helm, calling numbers and making corny jokes that the crowd expects. When he pulls B-8, for instance, he yells, "Oh, how I wish I had a . . ." and the crowd finishes his sentence, "B-8!" It's a callback to a V8 commercial that some are probably too young to remember, but it doesn't matter. Everybody laughs.

Mike seeks out folks who are lonely, and visits them. He has one friend whom he always takes to the harness races at the Mercer County Fair, because the friend's dad did that with him until his dad died. Mike is a volunteer dad. There are two elderly gentlemen at his church, St. John Lutheran in Celina, whom Mike visits every Monday, one right (Continued on page three)

(Continued from page one) before lunch, and one after. Mike is a volunteer son.

Old folks, middle-aged folks, young adults, kids. Mike sees human needs, and tries to fill them with his human self. He's looking forward to December 8 when he gets to be the sensitive Santa at Mercer DD for children who won't approach a Santa who is too loud or too jolly. Mike has a quiet, gentle way of welcoming them, which the kids appreciate.

Being the sensitive Santa is "one of the highlights of my life," Mike said. "I felt so moved by those kids, who kind of warmed up and came closer. The organizers asked me to be slow-moving and calm, and I said, 'I can do that."

Mike was born in Maria Stein to parents who volunteered, who went above and beyond as part of their normal lives. His parents' example is bound up in his mind with the lessons he has learned in church throughout his life. "The things in religion that stick with me more are 'love your neighbor,' help those in need. God wants you to do that. So I say, 'Okay, I can do that."

"Okay, I can do that." It's what Mike said shortly after his first visit to Cheryl Ann School in 1974. He had graduated from Bowling Green State University and had been in a high school classroom as a student teacher, and he had not liked it at all. "The kids didn't seem to care, and I lost interest in it," he said.

He worked in a factory for a couple of years before he decided to try again, this time as an elementary school teacher. He went back to school at Wright State University Lake Campus, where he had to observe classes with younger students. Someone suggested he also spend time at the Cheryl Ann School, and when he did, something that had long been waiting inside him clicked into place.

"I started going there on Fridays, and it was a ball," he said. "I fell in love with it. I liked the kids;

> they had an eagerness to learn. Sure, there were behavioral problems, but we knew we could deal with that."

He was hired as a teacher at Cheryl Ann the next year, 1975. By July 1982, he was named Cheryl Ann's superintendent. There was never any talk from him about a 40-hour week, a concept that in his mind simply did not apply. His work with and for people with developmental disabilities and their families "felt like what I was supposed to be doing."

He never doubted, even in those early years, that he would find a way to help the world. Or to

help one person, which to him is one and the same. He just had to give his destiny the chance to present itself. "I really believe, you have to be patient, but you also have to be prepared. Just wait," Mike said, "and when an opportunity arrives, it will feel like it was made for you."

Mike had the opportunity to build Mercer DD into a program recognized around the state for its innovative programming and dedicated people. He had the opportunity to place the Albert Heckler Award into the hands of Albert Heckler himself. He had the opportunity to help others. It was all he's ever wanted to do.

"Mike always has had a passion for the people we serve, and their families" said Shawn Thieman, who is the current superintendent of Mercer DD, and who considers Mike his mentor. "To him, it's a higher calling."

Shawn had the opportunity to place the award into Mike's hands.

"It was cool that I could give that award to Mike. It was a way to show my appreciation," he said. And a way to say to Mike, we saw what you did for all those years, and what you continue to do. We see you loving your neighbor.
